- April 2006** – Tender awarded to Domco Construction Inc.
- June 11, 2003** – Government approval for planning announced.
- 1986** – Pioneer Home expansion.
- 1966** – Pioneer Home built.
- 1961** -- Outlook Union Hospital built.
