

Background Information

Southwest Integrated Healthcare Facility

New building to be constructed in Maple Creek, adjacent to site of existing hospital.

Area residents and visitors will find a full range of health care services at the same location. This will reduce travel and waiting for services and increase community access to a range of previously unavailable specialty services. Video conferencing via the Telehealth network in universal care rooms will allow for consultation with specialists in other parts of Saskatchewan , saving time and money.

When construction is complete, all services from the Cypress Lodge Nursing Home and the Maple Creek Hospital will move to the new building, which replaces the Maple Creek Hospital, built in 1963, and the Cypress Lodge Nursing Home, built in 1971.

This project was announced in February 2009, as part of the renewal of 13 outdated health facilities in Saskatchewan. Provincial funding is provided under the government's Ready for Growth initiative. Local funding is provided by area municipalities and donations.
