Dr. Daniel Fox, President Emeritus of the Milbank Memorial Fund, New York, NY
(nominated by the Ministry of Health)

Daniel M. Fox, is an author of books and articles on health policy and politics and an adviser to public officials, leaders of provider systems in health and long term care, research organizations, publishers, and foundations. Before serving as president of the Fund (1989-2007) he worked in state government (Massachusetts and New York), as an adviser to and staff member of three federal agencies (the Office of Economic Opportunity, and Departments of Housing and Urban Development, and Health and Human Services) and as a faculty member and administrator at Harvard University and at the Health Sciences Center of the State University of New York at Stony Brook. He is a member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academies of Sciences, the Council on Foreign Relations, and the National Academy of Social Insurance. He earned AB, AM and PhD degrees from Harvard University.

He has been publishing regularly for half a century. In addition to peer-reviewed articles, commentaries and reviews in journals of health care, health services research, health policy, law and history, he is the author of *The Convergence of Science and Governance: Research, Health Policy and American States* (2010), *Power and Illness: The Failure and Future of American Health Policy* (1993 and 1995); *Engines of Culture* (1963 and 1994); *The Discovery of Abundance* (1967 and 2002); *Economists and Health Care* (1979); *Health Politics, Health Policies: The Experience of Britain and America 1911-1965* (1986); and *Photographing Medicine: Images and Power in Britain and America since 1840* (1988). Books he co-edited include *AIDS: The Burdens of History* (1988); *AIDS: The Making of a Chronic Disease* (1992); *Five States That Could Not Wait: Lessons for Health Reform from Florida, Hawaii, Minnesota, Oregon and Vermont* (1994); *Home-Based Care for a New Century* (1996); and *Treating Drug Abusers Effectively* (1996).
