

Traffic Safety Announcement Backgrounder Nov. 7, 2013

Traffic Safety Initiatives

Immediate action is being taken on more than half of the recommendations put forward by the Special Committee on Traffic Safety. The 14 action items include the following:

Impaired driving focus:

- Implementing zero drug and alcohol tolerance for drivers under 19 years of age, and for all drivers in the Graduated Driver's Licensing (GDL) program and Motorcycle GDL program (recommendation 1).
- Subjecting drug-impaired drivers to the same sanctions as alcohol-impaired drivers (recommendation 2).
- Strengthening administrative sanctions for drinking and driving, based on driver experience and number of offences, including mandatory ignition interlock for convicted impaired drivers and immediate roadside vehicle impoundments (recommendation 3).
- SGI will work with Corrections and Policing to determine and implement the optimal number of Drug Recognition Experts (recommendation 5).
- SGI will review the "Impairing Factors" section of the Saskatchewan Driver's Handbook (recommendation 11).
- SGI will analyze impaired driving data (recommendation 12).

Excessive speed focus:

- Lowering the speed threshold in the Safe Driver Recognition program from 50 km/hr to 35 km/hr (recommendation 16).
- Implementing a two-year photo radar pilot project at three high-risk locations and in school zones (recommendation 18).

Passenger safety focus:

 Making booster seats mandatory for children under 7 years of age, and less than 145 cm (4'9") in height and 36 kg (80 lbs) in weight (recommendation 25).

Traffic safety awareness focus:

- SGI will continue to work with First Nations and Métis communities to develop targeted traffic safety programming (recommendation 10).
- SGI and the Ministry of Highways will continue to work with First Nations communities to address local traffic safety concerns (recommendation 24).
- SGI will work with the Ministry of Justice and SLGA to research and implement technologies that can be used to make roads safer (recommendation 7).
- SGI will continue to produce traffic safety messaging throughout the year using various delivery methods (recommendation 9).
- SGI will review its communication strategy (recommendation 8).

Preliminary 2013* fatalities:

As of Oct 31, 2013, there have been 110 fatal collisions in Saskatchewan, resulting in 132 fatalities.

*These numbers are preliminary and are subject to change. Investigations are ongoing, therefore further details are not available at this time.

Tougher penalties for impaired driving

Administrative sanctions for drinking and driving, based on driver experience and number of offences (recommendation 3) will be strengthened in the province, as follows:
