A joint Ministry of Health/health regions initiative has resulted in significant reductions in wait times for children and youth outpatient mental health and addictions services since it began in June 2012. As a result of this work, the majority of child and youth outpatient mental health and addictions clients currently fall within the benchmark times for waits according to their level of need. Prioritization for mental health services in the health regions currently is based on the level of need and risk. The Ministry of Health led the development of a Mental Health and Addictions Action Plan with an inter-ministerial and cross-sectorial approach to address complex issues presented by mental health and addictions challenges. The Ministry of Social Services is a participant in the development of a multi-ministry implementation plan for the Mental Health and Addictions Action Plan that will inform future actions. The Ministry of Health held a Value Streams Mapping (VSM) Event in Regina, SK from March 23 to 26, 2015 that included representatives from Social Services, Health, Education, Regina Police Service and RCMP. At this event, an "Improvement Implementation Plan with Measures" and an action plan were developed. The VSM event indicated that participants were satisfied with prioritization of mental health and addictions services in health regions being based on level of need and risk as long as sufficient and necessary information is provided to inform assessments.
