Christine Boyczuk (Moose Jaw)

Among the accomplishments Christine is proud of are the collaborations with others in establishing programs for children and youth in Moose Jaw. These programs include summer literacy camps for children, autism camps (the Moxie Club), and planning the Strong Start Family Centre. Christine worked to establish the HUB approach in Moose Jaw, an intervention program for at-risk individuals, the implementation of the Drug Treatment Court, and the region-wide Violence Threat Risk Assessment Protocol and Process. Christine is a recipient of the Saskatchewan Centennial Medal, the 2014 Community Safety Award, the 2016 Business Women Lifetime Achievement Award, and the 2017 Citizen of the Year Award.

Ben Buhler (Osler)

Ben is an active volunteer in his community. For decades he has been a leader in sports organizations such as Warman Minor Hockey, and Osler Monarch Fastball. He donates his time and musical talent to church, school, and community activities. He spent several years as the SUMA (Saskatchewan Urban Municipalities Association) North West Region Director and was mayor of the town of Osler from 2003 to 2016.

David Burke (Kindersley)

David has been volunteering in his community for more than 41 years. He has served as the Rural Municipality Secretary and Kindersley Secretary/Treasurer, and is currently a senior captain on the town's fire department. David has been a baseball umpire for more than 30 years and has devoted much of his time to mentoring young umpires. He also has been involved with the Royal Canadian Legion since 1980, serving as president and executive member.



Janet Caldwell (Meadow Lake)

Janet has volunteered primarily in music and health care in Meadow Lake and area. Janet became an active volunteer in 1967, organizing a junior choir at Grace United Church, and was volunteer organist at the church for more than 50 years. In 1978, she helped organize the Meadow Lake and District Music Festival, serving on the festival committee for 30 years, also serving on the Provincial Music Festival Board. Janet has taught piano to more than 400 students. She has served in many organizations, including steering committees to establish home care services in Meadow Lake and to start an area Community Health Advisory Network.

Nelson Eng (Regina)

Nelson is a strong community advocate and philanthropist in support of many charitable and volunteer endeavours. Nelson's volunteer commitments have helped raise hundreds of thousands of dollars in support of the children's ward, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, the Pediatric Asthma Clinic, the Emergency Department of the General Hospital, and the Wascana Rehabilitation Centre. Nelson immerses himself in volunteer work that benefits diversity and inclusiveness. He holds regular fundraising dinners to support other community groups, such as Spring Free from Racism. He has received the Queen's Diamond Jubilee medal, the Saskatchewan Centennial medal, and the Senate 150th Anniversary medal.

The Reverend Alvin Hingley (Humboldt)

For more than 40 years as a United Church Minister, Reverend Hingley served in several Saskatchewan communities. During his ministerial work in these centres, he was always active in community initiatives, seeing volunteering as part of his community involvement. He is a founding committee member of the Humboldt Good Neighbour Store and a life member of the Humboldt Branch, Royal Canadian Legion. Reverend Hingley was Humboldt's Citizen of the Year in 2011 and has received the Queen's Diamond Jubilee medal, the Queen's Golden Jubilee medal, the Saskatchewan Centennial medal, and the Knights of Columbus Veteran of the Year Award.



Syl and Ivadelle Kulyk (Saskatoon)

Syl and Ivadelle are a couple that have been giving of themselves by volunteering for more than 40 years, making the city of Saskatoon and the province a better place. They have volunteered for Oliver Lodge, Veterans Tribute events, the Canada Remembers International Air Show Tribute to Veterans, Tim Horton's Brier, Scotties Tournament of Hearts, Saskatoon Police Volunteers, World Junior Hockey, Remembrance Day Services, Saskatoon Tourism Ambassadors, and the Royal University Hospital. They were awarded the Spirit of Volunteerism Award in 2003 and the Saskatoon Police Service Badge Award in 2008.

Myrna Nagy (Prince Albert)

Myrna goes above and beyond in convening and organizing many fundraising projects. Teena Polle (Prince Albert)

In 2002, Edna Poncelet created Cloth 4 kids (C4K) from her fabric and sewing shop in Saskatoon. C4K is a volunteer organization that sews and donates children's clothes for the needy. Since its inception, C4K has grown to more than 60 volunteers and, in 2017, donated almost 9,000 items free of charge to agencies that serve at-risk children and families such as the Open Door Society, Kids First Saskatoon, Friendship Inn, Interval House Saskatoon, YWCA, White Buffalo Youth Lodge, and Saskatoon Community Schools.

Barb Ryan (Regina)

Barb has been a long-time board member for the Regina Wascana Progress Club and Ranch Ehrlo. She has acted as a host, through the Regina Open Door Society, to new families from Africa and is now advocating for newcomers from Syria. Barb has started a support group called *Women to Women* for newcomer women. She has organized, volunteered, and raised funds for the Regina General Hospital's Children's Ward. Barb and her family also started the Bob Ryan Foundation in honour of her late husband. She is a recipient of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee medal, the Red Cross Humanitarian Award, and the Senate 150th Anniversary medal.

Mary Walters (Pilot Butte)

Mary Walters has been a dedicated volunteer with St. John Ambulance's Medical First Responder Program in Regina for 52 years, with more than 22,600 volunteer hours to her name. Mary has also volunteered for 25 years as a member on the St. John Ambulance Saskatchewan Council. She has received the St. John's Ambulance Chair's Commendation for her dedication and leadership in Saskatchewan and has been appointed as a Dame of Grace within the Order of St. John.
