SPSA Memorial Groundbreaking Event



- The memorial features a “helping hands” sculpture which exemplifies the critical role first responders play in helping and protecting citizens.
- Four granite monoliths will initially be constructed and will contain the engraved names of the fallen. There is room to add monoliths in the future if needed.
- Names will be added to the front side of the monoliths and more can be added to the back if needed.
- The two middle monoliths will contain the Saskatchewan Protective Services Medal and a commemorative message with a memorial ribbon engraved under the message.
- Along one of the sidewalks on the left side of the memorial will be three flag poles. The base of the flag poles will contain names of the founding partners.
- The construction process will also include significant landscaping for the perimeter of the memorial. A wide variety of plants that are native to Saskatchewan have been chosen with many of them holding special meaning, such as the Hope For Humanity Rose and the Thunderchild Crabapple Tree.
- The entire site of the memorial will be 25 metres wide by 20 metres deep.
- Produced by the SPSA, the estimated cost of the memorial is \$900,000, which includes a \$100,000 contribution from WorkSafe Saskatchewan, a partnership between the Saskatchewan Workers’ Compensation Board and the Ministry of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety.
- Construction is expected to be complete by fall 2026.
